
How to figure cousin status

Start with a brother or sister relationship several generations older than yourself. work down the chart, filling in children in each generation. From yourself count back to the brother or sister starting point, and if that number is 2, then you and the other person on the chart opposite you, are 2nd cousins. Here is a simplified single direct line (one child each generation) chart as a sample to show you the relationships. On the next page is portion of our total Churchill chart to show you cousins to the 4th cousin status and labeled with other relationaships you might be interested in. 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BLODGETT'S LANDING THEN AND NOW


The first tourists to visit the Lake Sunapee region had never heard of ice cream, T-shirts or windsurfing. They were American Indians who arrived in this area 11,000 years ago. As the glaciers of the Ice Age melted and their water started to flow toward the ocean, they created Glacial Lake Newbury, which was 30 feet higher than present Lake Sunapee. These facts are known because Dr. Sargent of Georges Mills, now deceased, excavated two of the paleo-Indian villages in this area. When the waters receded to form Lake Sunapee, a warmer climate caused plant and animal life to change. For instance, the caribou moved further north and the wild goose settled in. Some of the Indians followed their favorite game animals, while other Indians from the Ohio River Valley moved to New Hampshire, bringing new technologies with them. Gradually the paleo-Indians became the Penacook tribe, about which we know many things (visist the Mt. Kearsarge Indian Museum in Warner.) The Penacooks spoke the Algonquin language which was used throughout New England. In this language the words 'soo nipi' translate, in English, to "wild goose water."

"The Great Chief of the Penacook
Stood beside his young braves.
He said, "By signs that fail me not,
By wax and wane of moon,
I know the wild fowls, summering north
Come flying back south soon.
Now let us go to our northern lake
To Wild Goose Waters go,
The fatted birds by scores will fall,
Before our bended bow."


Evidences of Penacook summer settlements have been found near Newbury Harbor and in Soo-Nipi Park, north of Blodgett's Landing. The Indians were semi-nomadic, living in different areas in winter or summer, but staying near the lake into the autumn months to hunt the wild geese. They achieved this bow- and-arrow hunting while standing up in birch bark canoes. Also the fishing was good, then and now.

In 1630 a Boston exploring party were the first white men to set foot on the shore of the lake. Soon various European colonist/trappers visited the area, adopting the Penacook lake name. Thus, "Sunope Pond" is marked on both English and French maps made around 1700. By 1762 there was a permanent settlement, on the west side of the lake, called Cory's Town (later Wendell, then finally Sunapee in 1850). At the south end of the lake was Fisherfield (later Newbury).

During the 1870s the Concord to Claremont Railroad completed the laborious task of blasting granite and stone removal, creating the Newbury Cut. This promoted a stream of summer residents and visitors to the lake, and may have been the start of Lake Sunapee as a summer resort. Steamboats were built and soon were waiting at lakeside train stations to transport people and baggage to their various destinations around the lake. The trains ran regularly, four each day, until the early 1930s, then lived on to deliver mail and freight, until 1960 when the tracks were removed. Many of our reunion seniors can tell you what they heard, as children, on foggy mornings, when the sound of the train whistle and even the clickety-clack of the wheels coming into Newbury, carried across the water.




View of station from dock -

In 1875, George Blodgett, who owned the entire Blodgett's Landing acreage, built the first cottages and leased land for tenting. The first organized groups to rent campsites from Blodgett were the Civil War veterans, who gathered for reunions in the years following their victory. The Masons also used the campsites for annual festivities. An early group of visitors, who have left a lasting impression on the topography and personality of Blodgett's Landing, were the Spiritualists of New Hampshire, who started holding their annual Camp meetings at Blodgett's Landing in 1877. Soon, every late-July to early-September, their Camp meetings drew large crowds. At first, many tent sites were cleared, and later over 100 cottages were built, some very close to one another.




Since the Churchills were involved with the Spiritualist movement in Portland, CT, it can be assumed that they heard about the Camp Meetings at Blodgett's Landing and perhaps attended for several years prior to 1890. In that year, William Henry and his wife, Jane Hebert Churchill bought the 20 acres of land from George Blodgett, that they called Idlehurst, and retains that name today.

The brochure for the 1890 Camp Meeting which lasted for six weeks, noted that tent lots were available from George Blodgett at the irresistible price of \$2 per year for 20 years. We don't know how big those lots were, but the Churchills paid \$1000 for their 20 acres, forever. The local hotel was then known as the Forest House, catering especially to visiting fishermen. Frank Messer ran a country store, stocked with groceries and the usual goods for camping. A post office (started in 1883) was located in the hotel and a livery and boarding stable was nearby. Many small businesses sprang up in this village. The brochure describes the area as "one of the most popular summer resorts in New England...Blodgett's Landing is a "summer city"...on a gently-sloping hillside, shaded by a stately natural grove...ideal for enjoying the shoreline... a broad boardwalk, with railing, forms a promenade, high above the water's edge, along the entire front of the settlement (now Lake Avenue)...nearly parallel to the shore is Washington Street, which is an idyllic woodland lane with cottages being built on both sides.

Across from the hotel was the Casino (which had an auditorium, dance floor and bowling alley.) Many of our family remember attending functions there before 1970s when it was torn down. In the early 1900s, Will Cressey put on shows at the Casino and became a devotee of the area, building a magnificent resort house on Cressey's Point across from the Landing, to which many theatre celebrities visited.


One of the favorite sounds for all children and many adults was the steamboat's whistle when it was approaching the destinations around the lake. By 1891 there was an increase in business of rail-boat transshipment. People arrived from Boston and New York with vast mounds of trunks, wardrobes and suitcases, prepared to spend the entire summer at a favorite hotel or cottage. It was not unusual for the train to stand at the station a full half-hour while the perspiring baggage-men wrestled with all the trunks and cartons of meat and provisions, as well as mail.

Landing at Blodgetr's, Lake Sunapee, N. H.




Even today the excursion boat sounds its horn and people run to the dock to wave. After the steamboats' decline in the early 1920's, motor boats were still used to deliver weekend people and mail. But the era of the automobile meant the end of steamboating.

In 1900 there were only dirt roads in the area, even what is now Rt. 103 to Concord was a dirt road and it took 6 hours to travel by horse and buggy from Newbury to Concord. Every young man who came to town wanted to hire a horse and buggy. Old stagecoaches creaked up and down the hills around the lake, and the livery stables did a flourishing business.




Coaching parades were popular and each town held their own or participated in those of nearby towns. The whole town would turn out, and houses along the route were decorated. Blodgett's Landing was no exception. The picture above shows Churchill ancestors aboard their Idlehurst entry for a New London parade in 1905.

A description of Idlehurst appearing in Colby's Souvenir Guide 1897 stated: "Idlehurst, an attractive settlement adjoining Blodgett's on the north, is the property of Captain W.H. Churchill of Somerville, Mass. Fronting on Lakeside Avenue which follows the shore, are handsome residences: The Churchill's 'Sunflower Lodge', Annie P. Dimond's 'Pleasant View', Burke & Holmes' 'Burkholm', and Mrs. M.E. Lyddan's cottage. Three streets pass eastward from Lakeside Avenue to the New London turnpike, the principal of which is Indian Road, commanding an extended view."



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




Left: Washington Street & Post Office. The Post Office operated from 1883 until the 1970's.

In 1901 the Spiritualists built a temple on the lake side of Washington Street, just south of the Post Office, which had moved from the hotel to a cottage where Elmer Blodgett was the postmaster for years. You can still see the old letter boxes, intact and with original hand-lettered names of families, if you visit that cottage. And across the street you can find a bronze plaque mounted on a rock to mark the location of the Spiritualist Church. The Blodgett's map on page i, shows Idlehurst cottages and wharf (#794-800), the Forest Hotel (#877), Casino (#875), Post Office (#823) and Spiritualist temple (#834).

Today the Casino is gone, the Post Office is gone, the Spiritualist Temple is gone, and the trains and steamboats are gone. But Idlehurst remains, and the attraction of Blodgett's Landing was its diversity of people and unaffected pursuit outdoor activities. These characteristics have produced today a strongly loyal and devoted community, where many of the summer residents are descendants of the original visitors. Many cottages have been winterized and almost all have been improved in various ways. The atmosphere is that of a family-valued community, who still pursue friendship and fun, loving the peaceful rocky shores, the great fishing, the scenic beauty of the surrounding hills and mountains, and the sparkling clear waters for swimming and boating.

The Churchill Family reunion is celebrating its third ten-year reunion and we intend to have a great time! Thank you, Blodgett's Landing!



The Spiritualist Movement

When we think of our ancestors and their spiritual life, we tend to think of them in the traditional religions. But some of our ancestors, and in particular, the Churchills who bought and developed Idlehurst, participated in a new religious movement of the nineteenth-century, known as Spiritualism. Across America, people sought out mediums, psychics, and clairvoyants in attempts to contact the spirit world. Seances, planchette and the Ouija board became popular parlor games.

Spiritualism arose during a period when death and disease were everywhere, and people were looking for **proof** of life after death, rather than **faith** in life after death. It is interesting to note that Spiritualism and women's rights were intertwined. There have always been Christian Spiritualists and non- Christian Spiritualists. The two have much in common, although they may differ over the status of Christianity itself and the belief in reincarnation. Both would see Jesus as one of the greatest mediums ever. But they deny the divinity of Jesus and the person of the Holy Spirit. Spiritualists teach that the spark of divinity dwells in all people.


This movement began in March 1848 near Rochester, NY, focusing on spirit messages, trance visions and mediums (usually women). It grew in the 1850s and 1860s as trance mediums became public speakers for reform movements like education, women's right-to-vote, anti-slavery and other social issues. Mediums and seances became popular using the planchette and later the Ouija board. There was a general decline in the 1870s due to the exposure of fraudulent mediums. As the lecturing medium began to decline, many Spiritualists shifted their interest and activities to the Spiritualist Camps. Hundreds, perhaps thousands of people could gather in one setting to share in entertainment, hear reform speeches, socialize, privately consult mediums, hear Spiritualist lectures, and generally be involved in Spiritualist activities usually around a lake, beach, or mountain environment. Some camps lasted only two weeks and others became permanent Spiritualist communities. The oldest and biggest were: Lily Dale Camp in Chautauqua County, NY, started in 1855; the Cassadega Camp in Volusia County, Fl, started in 1894; and the New England Campmeeting Assoc. in Lake Pleasant, MA, started in 1874. 1

By 1890 the New England Assoc. was one of the largest camps with 500 cottages,

a grocery store and hotel. It spawned many other camps in New England, one of which was the New Hampshire Spiritualist Assoc., which held a number of camp meetings at Blodgett's Landing in the 1880s. From the 1885 program for the 8th annual Campmeeting, we know that it was quite well organized and George Blodgett, who originally owned all of Blodgett's Landing, was a committee leader.² He developed the community with all sorts of entertainment venues and the Spiritualist church on Washington Street.

As we have indicated before, Jane Hebert Churchill was very active in this organization, both at home and at Blodgett's. She wrote many articles and poems for Spiritualist publications, such as the "Sower", "The Carrier Dove", and "Banner of Light". Copies of original 1880s newsclips follow.

INTRODUCTION TO THE CALIFORNIA CONNECTION

About 1804, when President Thomas Jefferson got Congressional approval to buy the Louisiana Purchase, he estimated that it would take Americans one hundred generations to populate the west, but on a cold morning in 1848, gold was discovered at Sutter's Mill in far-off California. And the world rushed there!

Back in those days, it was a six month journey to Sacramento, either overland by covered wagon, or by ship around the Horn. Our Churchill ship captains were very familiar with travel by ship around the Horn, both Henry Ufford Churchill, then his son, William Henry Churchill. After the completion of the Transcontinental Railroad in 1869, travelers could ride the Iron Horse across the country in a matter of days.

Gold fever brought the initial rush of people to California and golden opportunities kept them coming, from all over the United States, but particularly some of our Churchill ancestors from Massachusetts. First, Henry, son of William Henry Churchill, then William and his wife Jane, and finally another son Wesley. It is appropriate that the great granddaughter of Wesley, who currently lives in California has written the following article.


The California Connection

Like his father before him, Henry C. Churchill was an adventurer. The firstborn of William Henry and Jane Douglas Hebert Churchill, young Henry cut his teeth on wild Connecticut berries and stories told by his seafaring father of lusty fortune seekers daring a journey around the Horn to San Francisco, the portal to gold. During stints at home between voyages, William – who had seen (as first mate onboard his father's ship) San Francisco transform from a tiny fishing village of a couple hundred people in the mid 1840s to a metropolis of one hundred-fifty thousand in two short decades – was a fountainhead of tales that enthralled his impressionable young son.

As a mature teen living with his family in Somerville, Massachusetts following the Civil War, Henry's eyes were trained to read the currents and the weather as he accompanied his father on tugboat duty throughout Boston Harbor and along the Charles River. In time, father and son together established a tugboat service featuring the Henry Chapel, a vessel touted as capable of pulling "with a steady strain of 2,000 (two thousand) horse power...." But Henry never forgot about the "golden" city raved about by his father, and prophesied by Richard Henry Dana to become the "centre of California's prosperity."

By 1889, Henry and his siblings, except for the youngest, Wesley (Wesley's twin sister Helen had died at birth), were all married. While sister Mary Elizabeth stayed in Massachusetts, John and Richard headed toward the western frontier, settling in Kansas. Unlike his maritime brother Henry, Wesley kept his feet planted firmly on the ground. After high school he attended the Massachusetts Institute of Technology. In 1889, he founded the Wesley B. Churchill Company, a shop in Cambridge, Massachusetts dedicated to building high-end leisure and racing bicycles, which he called "Churchill Wheels." Along with his enthusiasm for the bicycle, Wesley also developed a growing interest in a novelty called "photography," using a 4x5 box camera common to the time. (Thanks to Wesley's passion for photography, his descendants have a pictorial collection depicting life both in Massachusetts and California. Some of this collection follows this article) With his bicycle business thriving – he filed papers of incorporation in 1898 – his heart turned toward Eleanor Alice Hurl (called Alice), a lovely young Massachusetts woman from an upstanding family. In October 1897, they married, settling in Somerville.

William was in his late 50s when he retired from the tugboat business. In 1890, he and Jane purchased a 20-acre parcel of wooded property along the shores of Lake Sunapee in New Hampshire, which William planned to improve. Henry meantime traveled great distances on business: Bermuda, South America, and all across the United States, including that great Pacific coast city, San Francisco. His wife at the time, Amelia (Millie), traveled with him on occasion, but more often kept to their home in Boston and then Auburndale. Sometime during the decade, Henry opened an office in San Francisco. Soon thereafter, he and Millie set up housekeeping there, as well as in the San Gabriel Valley, where Henry also purchased a mesa of land butted by a canyon in the foothills, down the mountain from the Mount Wilson observatory and outside a small town called Sierra Madre. Drawn by the 1,400-foot elevation's characteristically fog- and frost-free climate, Henry hoped to turn a profit growing "extra fancy" oranges and lemons, as well as a variety of other fruit and nut trees. He also planted a spineless cactus propagated by friend Luther Burbank, a Massachusetts man who was then living in Santa Rosa. (This cactus




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can still be seen today growing along Skyland Drive. It turned out to be a good cash crop as food for cattle throughout the state.)

Sometime after Henry and Millie left for California, William and Jane followed. Records are unclear when exactly the two families moved to the west coast, or where they lived. Perhaps back and forth between San Francisco and New England, or possibly South Pasadena, an upscale town west of Sierra Madre where Henry and Wesley eventually owned homes. In any case, the warmer spring and summer months always drew the families back to New England, where Henry and William worked together to draw up plans for the Idlehurst property. A plot plan designating roads and lots where summer cottages had been built was recorded in Concord on May 11, 1898. Later that year, tragedy struck the family when Henry's wife Millie and William passed away within months of each other (William died on September 27, 1898).

Once a house was built on what Henry called *Sierra Nido Rancho* ("Mountain Nest Ranch") in Sierra Madre, otherwise known as the Churchill Ranch – Henry's diary indicates he was permanently residing there in 1902 – Jane moved in. Constructed of sturdy Oregon pine, the two-story, wood-sided house, with its wide veranda, full cellar and attic, emulated Henry's house in Boston. Dormer windows on all sides overlooked the sweeping San Gabriel Valley to the south-east, Santa Catalina Island to the west, and rugged Mount Wilson directly to the north. A six-foot-diameter well and pumping plant irrigated the entire 40-acre plot of land with fresh spring-fed water.

Due perhaps to a rumored illness suffered by Jane, Wesley and Alice moved to Los Angeles shortly after the turn of the century. In 1905, they moved again with a newborn son, Hurl, to 2051 Meridian Ave. in South Pasadena (family lore has it that Wesley built the house, which still stands today). Another son was born the following year, John Henry Holah. Being only six miles from the Churchill ranch, Alice and Wesley took their young sons on frequent visits to see their Uncle Henry and Grandmother Jane. Wesley delighted in photographing Hurl and John in the rustic setting of the ranch: playing with their toys; dancing in front of an old Edison phonograph; even posing one child as a photographer taking the other child's picture. One image shows Hurl cloaked under the black photographer's drape with John panting on all fours in the doghouse, with the family pooch looking on! Another shows Jane planted in a chair before the carriage house, lighting sparklers and firecrackers to her grandsons' evident delight.



Even after the ranch house was built, Henry continued to maintain a residence in San Francisco. While business as a salesman kept him on the road or at his office in S.F., the ranch – run by a resident foreman for \$40 per month plus a share of the profits from fruit sales – consistently produced bumper crops of oranges and lemons. One business trip, to Meriden, Connecticut, possibly saved Henry's life from the San Francisco earthquake and fire of 1906, which left his holdings in that city in ruins. Undaunted, he set up a new office and residence across the bay in Oakland.

In August of that year, Henry was on a train bound from Denver to Salt Lake City when it collided with another train in Texas Creek, Colorado. His diary tells of being thrown against the edge of a table in the dining car, where he had just concluded lunch with a bowl of ice cream. Everything – glasses, dishes, passengers – crashed to the floor as the car rocked off the track. Although a doctor pronounced his ribs, lung and abdominal injuries healed by mid September, later diary entries suggest he suffered chronic pain, with a cough and stomach ailments that drained him both physically and mentally until his death.

Sometime during this period, Henry wedded a second time, to a woman named Mary. It was an unhappy marriage that ended in divorce in February 1909. Meanwhile, in the summer of 1908, an Oakland acquaintance, Luella McCormick Hermann, moved to South Pasadena with her teenage daughter Hazel. In March 1909, Luella and Henry married in the home of Wesley and Alice.

Working at the Z.L. Parmelee Company in downtown Los Angeles, Wesley was a well-liked and respected superintendent. He often worked at the shop well past closing time, being the last one to leave. On one such fall night in 1910, a fire broke out, burning the building on South Broadway that housed the store. An investigation cleared Wesley of any wrongdoing or negligence, and the insurance company paid for all damages resulting from the fire, which was attributed to spontaneous combustion. Nevertheless, Wesley blamed himself for the blaze. For months he mulled over the episode, brooding himself sick. In mid-March, 1911, his family urged him to spend a few days at the ranch, thinking the outdoor work and fresh

mountain air would do him good. Instead, on the morning of March 24, he took his own life.

With two of Jane's children gone (John had passed away on Christmas Eve 1904), she longed to visit Richard, living in Kansas, whom she had not seen since 1893. In November 1912, Henry arranged a business trip that would take him and his mother to the prairie state. That same year or shortly thereafter, Alice received by bequest from Elizabeth Hebert Lyddan, Jane's sister, one of the cottages beside Lake Sunapee. She spent many a summer's day at Idlehurst with her sons. Throughout their lives, both Hurl and John carried fond memories of summers spent at the lake.

With Henry's physical condition worsening, he sought out Christian Science practitioners for healing and spent extended periods at various retreats looking for rest and relief. No longer able to work the ranch, in approximately 1915, he, Luella, Hazel and Jane moved out of the ranch house to a home on Brent Ave. in South Pasadena (this is likely the first Southern California home Henry lived in). From then on, the family divided their time between South Pasadena and Oakland, visiting the ranch only occasionally. In 1919, Jane broke her hip. She spent the remaining months of her life in The King's Daughters of California Home for Incurables in Oakland. In a letter dated June 14, she describes her desire to return home "to [Henry], Lou, Hazel, and dear little Barbara." Jane died on December 19, 1919.

Virtually nothing is known about Barbara, of whom Jane wrote. The 1920 Oakland census lists "daughter" Barbara L. Churchill as a child of 3-1/2, living in Oakland with Henry, Luella and Hazel. The immediate supposition is that she was Hazel's child from a marriage or other relationship. However, the birthplaces of Barbara's parents as listed on the census are New York and Iowa, which match the birthplaces for Henry and Luella, respectively, but not Hazel, who was born in California. Is it possible Henry had a child with Luella late in his life? Judging by the couple's wedding photo, Luella was many years Henry's junior and still within childbearing years. What a delightful possibility!

Sensing perhaps that he might not recover from his condition, Henry put the Churchill Ranch up for sale. A two-color brochure featuring six of Wesley's photographs advertised the property to perspective buyers. In 1921, Z.L. Parmelee – Wesley's old employer in Los Angeles – purchased the acreage. He subdivided the land, calling it Marlborough Terrace after the Duke of Marlborough, whose family name was Churchill, perhaps in memorial to his faithful employee Wesley. Lots initially sold for \$600 to \$1,850. The Churchill ranch house still stands today, as does the foreman's house and a couple of the packing houses, which were converted to residences. On March 27, 1921, Henry died.

Based on a Sierra Madre telephone directory of the time, Luella stayed in the area until at least 1925. Where or what she did after that is unknown. She died on March 14, 1958.

Alice became a stenographer and worked at a number of positions while raising her two young sons in South Pasadena. Few stories have survived about Hurl and John's childhood. In later years, John delighted to tell his own children about stealing ripe, juicy watermelons from the fields surrounding their home. Hurl was known for his temper tantrums, when he would dangle from the upstairs bathroom window until his bad humor subsided...or his hands got tired!

After graduation from South Pasadena High School in 1922, Hurl attended Southwestern University, followed by the Pacific Coast University College of Law. He was admitted to practice law in the state of California in May 1933, opening a practice in El Monte. In 1954 he was appointed clerk of the El Monte Municipal Court; in 1956 he was appointed court commissioner. In 1961, Governor Pat Brown appointed him as judge, replacing another judge who was called as a reservist back to active military duty. When Hurl's tenure as judge was over, eighteen El Monte probation officers wrote a letter to Governor Brown praising him:

"Judge Churchill is an outstanding example of justice for all individuals regardless of their station in life. His appraisal of each human being is that of warmth and understanding; yet he is able to protect our community and carry out the laws of this state."

Hurl married four times throughout his lifetime, surviving three wives. He had no children. He died on November 17, 1989.

John graduated from South Pasadena High School in 1924, after which he went to work as a courier. One day he made a delivery to an office in Los Angeles, where a beauty named Theresa Urbano worked. They were married in 1929. Early in the following decade, they opened a candy store in downtown Los Angeles called the Candy Kettle, where they made confections of various sorts and 3"-thick fudge. But within a few years, See's Candies, which had begun in San Francisco in 1921, moved into the area. The Candy Kettle could not compete with the larger company's corporate backing and lower prices, and went out of business. John held odd jobs after that, until eventually going to work for the California Department of Alcoholic Beverage Control. Meanwhile he and Theresa had begun a family – Jack Howard, born in 1930; Joanne Theresa, born in 1934; and Susan Louise, born in 1945. Jack remembers the days when his father worked for the ABC and would ask his friends to try to purchase liquor from various stores. If a sale was made, the proprietor soon found himself facing charges.

Her children grown, Alice sold the Meridian Ave. house to John and Theresa and moved to an apartment in Los Angeles. She willed her Idlehurst property to Grace Kellsey Worth in the late 1930s, but returned on occasion to visit family there. In her later years, she entertained her grandchildren with trolley rides to the beach. Alice died on March 31, 1959.

In 1950, John and Theresa moved with their family to a large lot on Le Roy Ave. in Arcadia, where John had built a California ranch-style home. After John's retirement from the ABC in 1970, he and Theresa moved to Parker, Arizona, where John again had constructed a house on a hillside overlooking the Colorado River. It was cleverly made of cement bags, stacked up and watered down. The large bags were filled with cement, set in place, then watered down to solidify the cement. This was a great insulator. Ever the home builder, he also built a summer cabin on a mountain lot in Strawberry, Arizona. But the Arizona sun got to fair-skinned John. In 1983, he and Theresa moved back to California, near Jack in Yorba Linda. Suffering from skin cancer and Alzheimer's, John passed away on February 16, 1993.

After living alone in Yorba Linda for a number of years, Theresa lived out the rest of her days in senior apartments. In Huntington Beach, she spent nearly every waking moment with her sister and lifelong friend, Ann. After Ann passed away, Theresa moved to Placentia, not far from Yorba Linda. In 2003, she decided to move to San Rafael to be near her daughter Joanne. Later that year, she fell and broke her hip. She passed away on December 12, 2003.

It has been my pleasure to write about my ancestors. Reading Henry's diary and researching their lives have provided a window to their souls, which I will treasure forever.



About

Wesley B. Churchill was born on February 24, 1873 in Middletown, Connecticut. He established the Wesley B. Churchill Company in 1889 in Cambridge, Massachusetts. The focus of the business was the manufacture and sale of high-end bicycles, which were called "Churchill Wheels". Numerous models were developed, for men and women, for both casual transportation and also for racing. The business prospered and grew, becoming incorporated under the laws of Massachusetts in 1898.



Wesley B. Churchill




The bicycle shop

A hobby of Wesley's was the fairly recent innovation called "photography". Being mostly self-taught, he began using a 4x5 box camera. Though being quite occupied with his thriving business, Wesley loved this new hobby and pursued the art of photography with a passionate enthusiasm.




Eleanor Alice Churchill

Wedding in Somerville, MA




The Churchill Ranch

William and Jane Churchill were living in California when, in September of 1898, William died. The elder couple had a residence on a large property in Sierra Madre, which is about 15 miles (as the crow flies) northeast of downtown Los Angeles. The property encompassed many acres of land, had flourishing orchards and groves, and was called the "Churchill Ranch". Widow Jane was living there a short while when Wesley and Eleanor Alice decided to move to Sierra Madre, to be near to his mother. The young couple traveled

by train over the Rocky Mountain divide and set up their residence very close by his mother, in South Pasadena. In 1904 the young couple had a baby boy, named Hurl, and then in 1906 had another boy, whom they named John.


All of the photographs which are depicted in this website were taken by Wesley B. Churchill in and around Los Angeles, with the exception of one shot taken from Wesley's "room" in their house in Somerville, and one shot taken from the train as Wesley and Eleanor Alice traveled over the Rockies to their new home in Southern California. Wesley was a prolific photographer, especially considering the difficulties and expense of taking pictures with the large bulky cameras of that time. His images of downtown Los Angeles and the areas surrounding that exciting new city exhibited his special gifts of artistic composition & lighting, along with meticulous attention to detail. Many modes of transportation of that day were captured on his 4x5 negatives, including trains, trolleys, horse drawn carriages, ships, bicycles, and walking. Many shots were taken of his family, including humorous photos of his boys during a 4th of July party at the Churchill Ranch. (Yes, that's young John in the dress and bonnet. My have times changed!) There are also interesting shots of his boys pretending like they are shooting pictures with Dad's camera, and also a shot that depicts John with an old Edison cylinder phonograph. There are several shots taken from Catalina Island, just off the coast of Los Angeles, including images of the little resort town of Avalon. Most all of the shots were taken with available light. Wesley had a unique skill with his portrait photography, combining an artful use of natural light with a knack for fun and interesting props, such as an old grandfather clock. Lastly, there are a few images included here which portfolio his skill at capturing beautiful images of nature, which also conveys his love of the great outdoors.





My memories of the 1938 Hurricane remain as vivid today as if they were just happening. September 21, 1938 began like so many fall days. We were living in Point of Pines, Massachusetts, a lovely beach community which was protected from severe ocean waves by Revere Beach on the west and Nahant on the east. It was an exciting time for me also because my Nana Kellsey came down from the lake to spend time with us and to be there for my birthday on September 27th.

I was at school as usual that day, but by noon the principal announced that the ocean had turned black, a sign of severe weather coming, and she felt it advisable to close the school early and see that all the students arrived home safely. The boys were trying to climb the trees in the school yard so as to enjoy the swaying ride they provided; however, they were admonished not to climb them and they reluctantly return to the ground. A girl friend of mine who lived on the beach road was left off at my house and my mother, Margaret Kellsey Church, was to drive her home. We piled into our car and headed down the block to the beach. The wind, by then, had increased to the point that my mother could not open the car door against the wind, so she pulled into their driveway in order to open the door on the lee side. Then, rather that take the ocean road back to our house, we turned around and returned in the direction that we had come.

Rain and winds continuing to increase in velocity kept our attention focused on the outside. By late afternoon I remember my mother and Nana sitting along side the mahogany table which held a special marble clock that had a barometer and the phases of the moon on it. I believe Grandpa Kellsey received this clock as a gift after the Chicago Worlds Fair. It is now in my brother's possession. The barometer held their attention for what seemed like hours as they watched to see when the storm would abate. The pressure recorded on it continued to creep downward until it reached a low of about 27.79". I am certain they were very concerned about the increasing magnitude of the storm, as well as Dad's safety. Dad had gone into Boston to work early that morning and we had not heard from him. Phones and electric had already been rendered useless — victims of the storm. Adding to the tension was my announcing that the ocean was

coming up our street, and the elm tree that grew between our house and the house next door was bending first over to touch us and then moving back to touch the house next door.

Finally the barometer began to rise and I sensed that Mom and Nana were somewhat relieved. Dad arrived home by taxi after midnight and had a harrowing story to tell about conditions in Boston, such as hanging onto a phone pole to keep from being blown over, and his efforts to find a taxi that would drive him to Point of Pines.


A telegram arrived a day or so after the storm alerting us to the damage sustained at Idlehurst. We set off by car to see what we could do. Dad took an ax and cross-cut saw with us, and they both came in handy, as we had to stop and clear the road several times along the way. After a prolonged journey, using at least a few alternate routes due to bridges that had been destroyed by the storm, we arrived at Idlehurst. We were shocked at the damage we saw. Three huge trees with trunks measuring approximately 2 ½ to 3 feet wide had crashed onto the "Indian Road Cottage". One of the trees came through Nana Kellsey's bed with its branches penetrating into the living room. We were so thankful that she had decided to be with us for my birthday and had arrived early to spend time with the family. Huge sections of the woodland behind the cottages, once filled with towering trees, lay flattened as if a giant had picked them up in his hand and laid them down again like a huge pile of pick-up-sticks. Wilfred Rollins spent many years thereafter cutting up downed trees in the wood land. He chopped enough wood to supply the Kellsey family as well as his family for many years. If you look about in the woodland today you may indeed see rotted remains of some tree left from that horrific storm. In New England, The Hurricane of 1938 had peak steady winds of 121 mph with gusts to 186 mph, a category 5 hurricane. Its path came across Long Island, up the coast into New England and ended in Quebec Province, Canada. (See articles taken from the Long Island Express)

I am not sure if there was insurance to cover the storm damage to the "Indian Road Cottage", but if there was it certainly was not sufficient to make all the necessary repairs. It was the time of the Great Depression and money was very tight, however Nana's daughter, Helen, did have funds available to repair the cottage and it was restored to its original condition. Later, Nana willed the cottage to all of her children, but

1938 Hurricane Damage at Idlehurst






Aunt Helen's siblings decided to sign it over to her because she had put so much into saving and repairing the cottage.

The following articles found on the internet tell the story of why no one suspected a hurricane on September 21st, and includes its path and other facts.



The graphic below from <u>Purdue University</u> shows the track of the Great Hurricane of 1938 as it moved across the Atlantic Ocean and up the Eastern Seaboard. At its peak intensity, the '38 Hurricane was a category 5 storm on the Saffir-Simpson Scale with maximum sustained winds of 161 mph. Position and storm strength vs. time are given in the table below the graphic.

September 21, 1938.

That morning a New York Times editorial entitled "Hurricane" concluded, "Every year an average of three such whirlwinds sweep the tropical North Atlantic between June and November. In 1933,

there was an all-time record of twenty. If New York and the rest of the world have been so well informed about the cyclone, it is because of an admirable organized meteorological service" (Allen, 1976).

Except for Charlie Pierce, a junior forecaster in the U.S. Weather Bureau who predicted the storm but was overruled by the chief forecaster, the Weather Bureau experts and the general public never saw it coming. Later that day, the greatest weather disaster ever to hit Long Island and New England struck in the form of a category 3 hurricane. Long Island, New York and New England were changed forever by the Long Island Express.

The immediate affect of this powerful hurricane was to decimate many Long Island communities in terms of human and economic losses, however, the long term effects linger today. The '38 Hurricane created the Shinnecock Inlet and widened Moriches Inlet which, to this day, are changing the landscape of the south shore due to their influence on the natural littoral sand transport. History has shown that these powerful storms are rare but do in fact occur with long-term frequency. Case studies have shown that the next time a storm like the Long Island Express roars through, it might be the greatest disaster in U.S. history.

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Did You Know?

In 1821, there was a violent tornado and hurricane that passed across the northern fortion of Lake Sunapee, through New London, across Mount Kearsarge and into Sutton. As it passed across the lake, it drew up vast quantities of water...its appearance was terrifying, about 340 feet in diameter. This storm caused buge waves and the loss and destruction of buildings all around the lake. It also caused incredible damage or obliteration of livestock, businesses, and human lives. (1)

That this year we are celebrating 115 years (1890-2005) of Idlehurst property still owned by Churchill heirs?

How the Idlehurst cottages were named?

When our great grandfather William Churchill built 7 cottages between 1890 and 1897, the homes had names rather than the street number designations required for 911 Emergency Response of today.

7 Sunlite Lane, originally had rose bushes planted along the lane beside the porch, so it was called "Wild Rose Cottage". Sometime in the 30s or 40s, it was painted gray, and became known as "Gray Gables."

1 Lakeside Road, was originally built for Mary Elizabeth Hebert Lyddan, Jane Churchill's sister. Mrs. Lyddan, known as "Aunt Libby Lyddan" willed it to her nephew Wesley's widow, Eleanor Hurl Churchill, who called it the "Hurl Cottage". Sometime in the early 40s Eleanor Alice Churchill deeded it to Grace Worth who dubbed it "Hurl-Worth Cottage". Grace sold it to the Thompsons about 1950, who previously had annually rented Sunflower Lodge for a month. Ralph Thompson constructed a two-story back addition for bedrooms and bath. Of note are the windows in the upstairs bedroom, as they were in the original Spiritualist Church in Blodgett's Landing. When the church was dismantled, Mr. Thompson was able to get some of the windows and he used them in this addition. Later, he sold the cottage to another couple and today, their children reside there in summer. Two generations of the current family worked for Goodyear and they renamed the cottage "Wingfoot".

5 Lakeside Road was called vaious names over the years as it had several owners. Originally called "Burkeholm", it is now owned and renamed by a Churchill heir who calls it "Churchill Manor."

Did You Know? (continued)

9 Lakeside Road was named "Sunflower Lodge" by the builder because his son Richard, who raised alfalfa and sunflowers on his Kansas ranch, stayed there when he visited with his family. This information was related to the present owner by Vivian Crim Sharp, Richard Churchill's great-granddaughter. Another interesting note is that the Sunflower is one of the Spiritualist symbols, and Jane Churchill was involved with that movement (see Spiritualism article). A copy of the Lake Sunapee News, dated 1896, contains an article about "Mental Science" classes given by Jane Churchill at Sunflower Lodge.

5 Indian Road was where Nana Kellsey and her six children summered and they called it "Indian Road Cottage." When her daughter, our dear Aunt Helen Kitchin became the owner, the name was changed to "Hasty Pudding." We have heard that the name referred to a 'quickie dessert' that Nana Kellsey used to make, but it also has been understood that the name was in honor of the Harvard University Thespian Club of that name, to which Mrs. Kitchin had a connection.




This tree (photographed about 1957) in front of "Sunflower Lodge" was one of only a few that remained along the frontage of Blodgett's Landing after the 1938 hurricane. This was probably because its roots wound down and around the great rocks of the shoreline. My father calculated that this tree was 93 feet tall. During my childhood, it was always a visual landmark for "home" when my cousins and I were out on the water in boats. It was struck by lightning, cracked and blown half down on June 24, 1966.

In the fall of 1949, Jane and Nell Mulligan were packed up and ready to go home to Hartford CT. Jane was just coming toward the car carrying her cat, Rufus, and her hat.

She couldn't believe what she saw! The car was rolling down Indian Road toward the Idlehurst dock. It crossed over Lakeside Avenue and hit the edge of the dock and turned over "just beyond the stone steps and iron railing". [In those days Lakeside Avenue had not been raised for the sewerline.] The left side of the car was on the sand and the wheels were on the rocks at the side of the dock. Jane dropped the cat and ran down to find Nell unhurt but unable to exit the car. Some friends visiting with Helen Kitchen were able to get Nell out of the car thru the upper side. Jane wrote to Grace Worth, "The garage people from Warner did a splendid job of lifting the car and righting it onto the dock by using a cable rope hitched around the huge pine tree in front of Sunflower cottage" (4) [the pine tree on previous page]. The car was repaired and used for years- that's how they made cars before WWII.



Have a wonderful time and may the peace of the Lord be with each and everyone."


Carolyn also sent the following description of the day of the Hurricane and the damage to their home and business.

Friday, August 13, 2004 will be another one of those "DATES" for us. We never could have guessed in a thousand years that it would happen to us. As far as the weather service knew, Charley was headed for Tampa Bay, but changed direction and focused his wrath on our section of paradise with a Category 4 Hurricane. Seeing as we are a water-front community, time was short, so there was no time to evacuate. It was a hellish, horrible time and unless you've gone through it, you can't begin to understand how your life changes when something tragic like this happens. As the storm was on top of us, we watched our neighbors roofs ripped off, walls collapse, and heard the howling winds and snapping trees. Trees 30 to 60 years old, snapped like matchsticks or were ripped from the earth like weeds. We closeted ourselves in the center of the house in a closet with pillows, cushions and a mattress. The rumble we felt inside the closet was like a train passing through, as we all huddled in silent prayer. We had no way to know if our roof would be ripped off, or our walls collapse onto us. The pressure I felt in my ears, as the storm peaked, hurt so bad, and I was sure they would bleed. Not knowing if my daughter, Carrie-ann, was alright, worried me, because she was at work in Punta Gorda, where they were evacuating the area. I have never been so scared in my life. My grandson, Joshua, was the strong one during the whole time. He was my hero, no tears, bravery at its finest...even to the point of snapping me out of hysterics on several occasions. "Grandma, it's alright, we're fine, and we still have each other...Stop Crying! "I knew he was right, but it was so hard. I gulped

back my terror and tried to be strong for him and Samantha. I wanted to cry for weeks. But I won't complain about the level of damage our home received, because I look around at my neighbor's homes and hear their stories. It has been a great lesson in gratitude. I was so grateful for a cold drink, a clean bed, a hug from a friend, free ice even when the heat and humidity afterward was unbearable. We thanked God for the night and darkness, so we could forget the sights of our community looking like a war zone. A time so we could rest, and reenergize. The outpouring of love and support to our little town was tremendous and uplifting. In those first few days power trucks from distant states came to repair damaged wires. We had a long time of no electricity, no hot water, no real food, no phones, no internet. Our store was devastated! I am very grateful that the day before Charley, our son Richard moved several completed pieces onto the cutting table and covered them with large sheets of plastic and stapled it to the table. They were saved. By October we were lucky to be able to move into 800 square feet, but soon were so cramped for space with customer's furniture, we rented an additional 1000 sq. ft. (Naturally everybody in town needed furniture reupholstered) So we are booked 3-4 months in advance - a good thing for business, but no time to do it all. We had to work on our house but there was little extra time.

Since the 95' reunion my daughter, Samantha Elizabeth was born. It was February 7, 2000, that she entered my life and I find her to be a very lively youngster, full of energy and love. Joshua thirteen years old in May of this year has been amazing us all with his ability to play the saxophone. From the first moment that he picked the saxophone up we knew he had a special talent. On Palm Sunday, this year, he played *Jesus Loves Me* at our church in Punta Gorda. I was so proud that tears filled my eyes and my heart leaped with joy as I watched him perform.

In October of 2003 I purchased my first house with the help of my parents and their support. All I can say is that it was an amazing experience. Tension kept us on edge right up to the very last signature on the papers. Twice before the closing had to be postponed and on the third attempt it seemed as if it was a done deal when the fire alarm went off at Sun Bank Building where our closing was in progress. Apparently there was smoke filling the third floor. Everyone grabbed papers, the computer and anything else of importance and we left the building. On a bench in front of Sun Bank Building we sat down and I signed the final page of the closing documents to the sounds of fire sirens and horns. At last, I was a home owner. Mom and Dad had helped with the finances by selling their two precious antique cars (a 67 Camero and a 67 Cougar). We decided together to secure the children in a stable home and raise them as a family since my divorce. It has been a family affair, including my brother Richard doing a lot of electrical and dry wall work. Mom and Dad paid for and installed our new kitchen and they made major renovations to the existing bathrooms. Together they laid the tile I supplied for the kitchen floor. Along with these changes I was able to supply our home with a new roof. So we had a roofing party where friends and family joined in to help tear off the old roof, then Dad and Richard replaced the roof. It only took about one month from start to finish and on the last day with the last nail hammered in it rained. Repairs and upgrades on the house changed it from a fixer upper to a beautiful home.






We celebrated our $50^{\rm th}$ anniversary two years ago this coming September, at which time our kids gave us a wonderful party.



I grew up in Orange, CA, which is in the heart of Orange County. I'd say that visual art has been a "passion" in my life since the 4th grade, when my teacher assigned me and my friend to paint a large mural on a wall inside our classroom. I really disliked school up to that point, but this project and the continuing exploration of creativity really got me into school from that point forward. I got further involved with painting and drawing and some ceramics work, and then in my freshman year in high school I was introduced to photography. This totally enthralled me, and this new-found love of photography prompted me to leave painting and drawing in the dust! I joined my high school yearbook staff in my sophomore year as a photographer and got very involved with it.

My dad, Jack Churchill, built me an excellent darkroom in our garage, complete with nice counters and cabinets, a faucet and sink, a light box, and even the luxury of a sound system and a telephone. I was in heaven, working in that darkroom day and night, exploring and experimenting, manipulating images and printing them. At that time, I learned about the amazing photographic work of my great grandfather, Wesley Churchill. He lived in the Sierra Madre area, a few miles northeast of Los Angeles. In the early 1900s he shot truly awesome photographs of the entire Los Angeles area, including an image of the original Angel's Flight in downtown LA, shots of the Redondo Beach pier, shots of downtown Long Beach, shots of locomotive trains, "the Churchill ranch", family members and many other places. So, Wesley was definitely a very inspirational person in my life. (To see his outstanding work, visit website: www.wesleychurchill.com). I continued working on the yearbook staff throughout high school, becoming the photo editor, and I also took independent study classes in photography, having a particular interest in special effects, manipulated imagery, unusual color film stocks, and creating multi-projector slide shows with music. I also pursued video production and film animation during my last two years of high school.

After high school I attended UC Santa Barbara and continued my study of photography, film animation and motion picture special effects. Using a 35mm special effects camera, an animation stand and a motion picture optical printer there, various techniques were explored to further grow in this field. Following college, I worked for a company in Orange County which had just developed a state-of-the-art special effects camera system, and then I later worked for a company in San Diego which was producing large 30 projector multi-image slide shows. In 1982 I struck out on my own and founded the first San Diego company to produce computer animation. Clients included Coca Cola, General Dynamics, Union Oil, Southwestern Cable, Metrocast, Honda, and TV stations all over the country.

In September of 1986 and again in 1987, I organized, promoted and hosted two computer animation festivals at the La Jolla Museum of Contemporary Art, which were the first such shows of their kind in the world. 17,000 people paid to see these film presentations in the theater at the museum, selling out many of the shows. The purpose was to raise public awareness of computer animation as an art form and communication medium. In 1988 I produced the very first home entertainment video of computer animation ever released, called "State Of the Art Of Computer Animation". I then decided to focus my company solely on producing these videos of computer animation, which began to be sold in video stores around the world. That first video won the "Best Video Art" award from the American Film Institute at their American Video Conference Awards Show in November of 1988. Then in 1990 I produced the first in a series of videos called "The Mind's Eye". These videos have featured computer animation from around the globe combined with original scores created by Grammy winning music artists like Jan Hammer, Thomas Dolby, Kerry Livgren and Tangerine Dream. Sony Music became one of my distributors, and so far 30 different DVDs of computer animation have been produced. The website for my company is www.AnimationTrip.com. And in the last few years I've "returned to my roots" by plunging back into photographic art. My work can be seen at various galleries in San Diego and at the website www.stevenchurchill.com. I still totally enjoy exploring and creating with this art form!

Concerning more personal topics, I was married in 1979 and had a wonderful son named Noel in 1982. My wife was a stay-at-home mom while I worked. After a few years of marriage she decided she didn't like marriage and motherhood and left to "find happiness" elsewhere. Since then I've been a single dad, joyfully raising my wonderful son, who just graduated from UC Santa Barbara this June. He is 23 now and his degree is in Business Economics. He's very bright and clever, and he's my buddy! I love to travel and I've had the chance to visit many places in the world (Italy, Spain, France, England, Monaco, Netherlands, Morocco, Japan, Mexico, and Hawaii), and I've brought Noel with me to many of those spots. One other very significant personal topic to share about, many years ago I was eagerly exploring and seeking "spiritual truth". I came to discover that Jesus is the truth, began reading the New Testament, and I became a Christian. God has truly been a constant source of joy and guidance to me for over 20 years now.



BOOK-STYLE GENEALOGY WITH DATES, PLACES, AND ADDRESSES

This genealogy begins with the eighth generation of a certain line of Churchills descended from Josiah Churchill who settled in Wethersfield, CT in 1638.

This genealogy follows one of the accepted book format and numbering systems. The numbering is in the form $\underline{a}.\underline{b}$ where \underline{a} is the generation number and \underline{b} is the child number in that generation. Each child in a family group, in that generation, has a number given in numeric sequence, oldest to youngest in their group, but not necessarily in age order among cousins. In the sixth and subsequent generations, the numbers skip in order to allow for additional entries in family groups. Where children are married, spouse's name(s) is in column 2. Common genealogical abbreviations are used: b.=born, m.=married, d.=died, bu.=buried, div.=divorced.
